

Orphan was defined as a child who has been abandoned or has lost *both* parents. A new study by an international children's charity has found that 4 per cent of India's child population of 20 million are orphans. Most of these children have been abandoned by their parents. Poverty has been a significant contributor in high orphan children. Many orphans are actually not 'orphans' in the literal sense - they simply have been put into foster care by families who find it hard to take care of them. Often, it is due to an absent or negligent father, and a working mother and a mother who must work and doesn't have the time to provide care. These parents consider an orphanage's care infrastructure to be better than their own home and care. Orphaned children are greatly in need of care in protection, being among the most susceptible to poverty, child labour and child trafficking. The Colleges as HEI's social responsibility is to work towards addressing the needs of these children by providing them with nutrition, education and protection.

With the advancement in the medical science today, the life expectancy has been increasing resulting in the phenomenon of 'population ageing'. This significant rise in the number of senior citizens and their proper health care and privileges for them are matters of great concern and challenge before us and especially before higher education institutions which can orient common people towards this noble task.

4. The Practice/Modus operandi:

The teachers and the students of the Government college for Men, Kurnool visit old-age home situated at "Amma Old Age home" at Maddur Nagar and "Keerthana Orphanage at Santhosh Nagar to enquire about their requirements, problems and facilities. The students are grouped and trained to take initiative and solve their specific problems like basic needs, medical needs and emotional needs. Our college collected donations for the orphanage and old age home. Later they donate blankets, medicines, rice bags, mosquito nets to old age home and orphanage. Students are asked to write about their experiences of the visit to oldage home and orphanage and take pledge to be sensitive to the needs of the old in their family and

surroundings. The students of the college make donations to Non –Profitable organization working for the cause and care of the elderly and orphans in India for the last nearly three decades and associate with its activities. The emphasis is not just on donating money but reviving the age-old cultural values of India that regard the old as an asset and not a burden and give them the much-needed company and feeling of belongingness.

5. Evidence of success:

In the present-day society, the emotional bond between parents and the children seems weakening for various reasons, giving way to individualism among children. While for youngsters, their perception of home as a cherished place to go back to has been shattered before their very eyes, for the old, indifference by family members has assumed menacing proportions. In this context, this practice has certainly made an impact. It has extended a helping hand to the orphans and aged citizens of the local and surrounding areas, and has also infused a sense of responsibility and respect amongst the students towards the aged people. The HEls can awaken the students to realize their responsibility towards the orphans and senior citizens.

6. Problems encountered and Resources required:

There are always financial constraints. These are sought to be overcome with the help of various clubs and societies of the city.



















.BEST PRACTICE-2

1. Title of the Practice: Motivational and Personality programmes by the students in the surrounding schools and colleges of Kurnool District.

2. Goal/ Objective:

- > To liberate the weaker sections of the rural areas from the shackles of the perennial, economic, social, political and educational constraints.
- ➤ To provide social dimension to the educational system of the college and inculcate social responsibility and commitment in students.
- > To bring forth the team spirit and leadership qualities of the students and broaden their social outlook that will help them work for the welfare of the community.
- To motivate the rural students through personality development programmes.
- ➤ To restore gender equity and make available equal opportunities to emerge full-fledged and take up new ventures.

3. The context:

Kurnool is surrounded by tiny villages, some with very thin population and incredibly with lowest percentage of literacy. Ignorance and illiteracy estrange them from the fast moving hi-tech world. The numbers of suicide cases were also increasing. According to information provided by the SP office, at least 500 suicide cases have been reported from different parts of the district since January, 2016, to October. Of this, students and youth account to 30-40 per cent of suicides. 20% of Suicidal deaths are of the age 11-20 in the case of girls and 40% in case of boys.

Loneliness, academic pressures, nuclear families, worry about failures and social media are among the many reasons that are driving students to commit suicides in Kurnool district. Smart phones, internet and social networking sites are also stated to be the reason that is exerting peer pressure which, in turn is driving students to resort to such extreme step in case of failures. Hence it is imperative on the part of the college to extend their service and give exposure which is the dire need of the people.

4. The Practice/Modus operandi:

"Chaduvu –Vijayam" (Education-Success) foundation was established by students of Government College for Men, Kurnool. The teachers and the students of the various organs of the college like NSS, NCC and Clubs of the college visit schools and junior colleges to enquire about their requirements, problems and facilities. As per the school information report for the academic year 2015-16, there are a total of 4,179 schools. They include, 78 government, 2,398 mandal and zilla parishads, 1 residential, 1,355 private, 33 model, 53 Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya (KGBV), 140 municipal and 121 other types of schools. The total number of students enrolled in primary, upper primary and high schools of the district are 631,740.

The students of schools and colleges are grouped to discuss their specific problems like basic needs, health needs and emotional needs. Students are motivated to continue their education by inspirational speeches as illiteracy is one of the main cause social backwardness in the society and for personality development. They are trained to learn life skills to handle peer pressure. More than 300 motivational songs are sung by our college students for inspiration. Health camps are conducted as part of "Bhayapadaku-Digulupadaku" (Fear Not – Worry Not) programme. Mr. Ravi Babu wrote many inspirational songs on "Educated Girl Child is a illuminated Light" theme which stress importance of girl education particularly in rural areas.

5. Evidence of success:

The services of Government College for Men, Kurnool have yielded satisfactory results to various disciplines as fruits of their hard labour and selfless service. The outcome of the outstanding performances of Chaduvu-Vijayam foundation is highlighted below:

- > Created good rapport with the village leaders, parents and school teachers.
- Enriched and Imparted social and moral values to school students.
- ➤ Helped the school and junior college students to learn life skills and handle peer pressure.
- ➤ Helped the community in reducing suicidal deaths.
- > Given awareness of fatal diseases like AIDS and T.B.
- > Tackled health hazards by maintaining good health and hygiene
- Eradicated illiteracy by encouraging the school dropouts for readmission at schools

6. Problems encountered and Resources required:


